

FRIDAY MEMO

January 21, 2005

- 1) Engineering and Planning departments continue to work together to bring the Downtown Parking and Traffic Management Plan (DTPMP) to fruition. Policies in support of the Plan will be added to the Comprehensive Plan and staff will bring the DTPMP to City Council for adoption in spring of '05. In addition to parking management strategies for downtown, the DPTMP will help address parking and traffic management issues within a special planning area that includes downtown and Historic Milwaukie neighborhood.
- 2) The design phase of the McLoughlin project is complete and plans and specifications are being reviewed ODOT in anticipation of a March bid date. Right of way acquisition has been somewhat slower than expected. As a result, the bid date for the project has been pushed out 90 days to July. The City of Milwaukie will manage the demolition of the Kroll building and Antique Mall building scheduled now for April/May.
- 3) A five-year progressive rate increase is scheduled to take effect on July 1, 2005 and continue at approximately 3.5% per year through 2010. The increase is needed to fund new regulatory mandates related to surface water quality. The city must also de-commission a number of dry wells due to their proximity to city drinking water wells.
- 4) Engineering will initiate a conversation next month with Historic Milwaukie NDA to determine location and type of traffic calming devices to be installed in the neighborhood. There is currently a budget of \$40,000 this fiscal year and another \$25,000 in next year's budget to implement a program designed to divert cut-through trips and calm traffic through the neighborhood.
- 5) The Engineering Department is working closely with the Planning Department to work through traffic impact issues related to the rezoning of a block located west of the Marketplace. Gramor Development plans on 28,000 square feet of retail/commercial uses. The developer will be required to make improvements to the intersection of OR224 and Oak Street with some participation by the City.
- 6) Clackamas County continues to advance the wastewater consolidation plan that would eventually decommission the Kellogg treatment facility. Oak Lodge Sanitary District has scheduled a vote on March 8 regarding the District's participation. A "no" vote by Oak Lodge is not expected to affect the feasibility of the consolidation plan.

- 7) Milwaukie continues to get calls from property owners in unincorporated Clackamas County, east of the city limits and west of I-205, seeking sanitary sewer services. The City and County staff will meet to discuss near term options available to provide service.
- 8) Community Services will sponsor a citywide volunteer recognition event in April. Jason Wachs will coordinate the effort. All members of boards and commissions as well as other City volunteers will be invited to the event.
- 9) A meeting with Island Station neighborhood folks and people interested in Spring Park will be held at City Hall on January 27th at 7 pm. City staff will present potential locations for parking near Spring Park.
- 10) Charlie Ciecko, Director of the North Clackamas Park and Recreation District, will attend the January 25 Milwaukie Parks Board meeting to provide the Board with an update on the North Clackamas Park Ball field proposal.
- 11) The City has received a grant from Clackamas County Environmental Youth Corps - which will provide the City with 6 workdays of youth work crew service at Spring Park. The youth crews will be removing invasives from the western boundary of Spring Park.
- 12) Next week, Les Hall, Code Compliance Coordinator, will participate in a countywide data gathering exercise coordinated by the Coordinating Council for Homeless Programs and Clackamas County Social Services to identify homeless camps. The effort seeks to survey the needs for housing in the county. The data generated by this effort will be used by the County to apply for a HUD grant for next fiscal year.
- 13) We are holding oral boards to fill two vacant police officer positions on Thursday January 25. Leonard Ford accepted the position as Utility Worker I in Streets and Tyler Gillette is working for us on a temporary basis as a mechanic and conducting an inventory of the Fleet parts.
- 14) The City received its first Ballot Measure 37 claim this past week. The Claimant owns property located at 8616 SE 28th Place. His Ballot Measure 37 claim involves lot size requirements. Planning and legal staffs are reviewing the claim pursuant to the City's Ballot Measure 37 ordinance.
- 15) My apologies to you for the apparent failure of my e-mail system to forward last week's Friday Memo. It was written and sent on Saturday

morning, but no one seems to have received it. I resent it to Pat and have asked her to forward it to you.

16) FYI, I am including a questionnaire regarding library services with this Friday Memo. By virtue of the fact that "M" fell next in line for the revolving Chair of the Library Network Intergovernmental Board (LNIB), I assumed that position following defeat of the levy in December. Recognizing the fact that the library system in the county faces rough times, we have once again undertaken the task of looking at changes that might preserve a reasonable level of services. I convened a small group, and we wrestled with the issues for 2 long meetings. The questionnaire is the result of those meetings. We are asking that each library director and city manager complete it. The small group will then review it to determine next steps. This has become an almost annual exercise. However, it now takes on additional significance given the fact that we do face a precipitous drop in county funding. I thought that the questionnaire presented enough new information to be of interest to you. An additional issue⁴ facing the LNIB is the future direction of the MIX program. That program reimburses each county in the region for loans to out-of-county patrons. It has been in existence since about 1986. There are some within the LNIB (mostly those who do not have residents who use other libraries or out-of-county patrons who borrow from them) who wish to terminate the program. The LNIB Director and I will meet with Multnomah County too see if we can gain enough financial concessions to keep the program alive.

At the last LNIB meeting a small group was designated to look into the advisability of new strategic thinking in light of the defeat of the County-wide Library Levy in November 2004. The impact of that defeat ranged from a 14.4% to a 23.2% reduction in County funding of local libraries between the projections for FY 04-05 and FY 05-06. The group looked at a number of issues. The first was to define the questions that should be answered in order to make appropriate decisions:

STRATEGIC QUESTIONS

- A.** Currently LINCC is a loosely knit confederation of local libraries with some level of funding from Clackamas County. Can we ever become a more unified library system that has joint responsibility to provide library service county-wide?
- B.** In your opinion, as members of LNIB should we be primarily advancing the interests of the library system in Clackamas County, or should we be primarily advocating for formulas and strategies that benefit our own libraries?
- C.** Is a County Library one which is funded and operated by Clackamas County, or does it include those libraries whose funding is 100% derived from the County?
- D.** Do we have the right number of libraries to serve the users effectively and efficiently? Do we have the libraries located in the right places?
- E.** Given the crisis in available library funding, do we still have the right number of libraries, and are those libraries located in the right places?
- F.** Should fiscal maintenance of effort from cities be a requirement for obtaining county funds for libraries? If so, how should it be defined and set?

The Process Committee learned things that may influence future decisions. They are:

POLITICAL / FINANCIAL REALITIES

- Projections for FY 2005-06 may with some comfort assume \$6,385 million in County funds. However, no certain amount is guaranteed beyond that date, and the on-going amount will depend on the County's overall demands and priorities. The only "guarantee" is that the amount will not increase.
- The question of creating a countywide district will not be placed on the ballot.
- It is unlikely that we will see another county-wide library levy on the ballot before 2010 as there are other County priorities that will now be given a chance at the ballot. (Remember that every election costs the County \$100,000.)
- It is not safe to assume that funds saved from closing a County branch library would be added to the amount available for distribution.
- There are almost an infinite number of "solutions" for providing library service in Clackamas County that may be defined by changing governance, structure, and/or the allocation of funds.

The questions and the issues facing the libraries in Clackamas County admit to no easy resolution. The system faces a present shortage of funds, a future in which funding will most likely further decline, and many users placing demands on the facilities, staff and funding that is available. In order to meet the challenges facing the system, the LNIB Process Committee identified a few strategies, some of which were:

STRATEGIES/SOLUTIONS

- aa.** Do nothing and see what kind of library network, library service providers or county-wide library service evolves over the next 5-7 years.
- bb.** Do nothing now, aim for a 2010 vote, and then see what kind of library network, library service providers or county-wide library service emerges.
- cc.** Create a countywide library district on the east side (although at this point it seems unlikely to be placed on a county-wide ballot).
- dd.** Define an affordable “standard” library for Clackamas County, determine how many of these standard libraries can survive in the current funding crisis and where they should be located and then fund only these from county funds.
- ee.** Define a minimal level of service that can be supported with available funds and fund each library at that level, leaving any enhancement of that minimal level to local city/county funding. County-wide funding to specific libraries would continue only as long as the minimum level of service was being met.
- ff.** Close the County libraries, apportion the available County funds to each remaining city library (based on either population served or assessed value), and then reimburse cities for circs to unincorporated areas. Alternatively, the funds realized from closing county libraries could be used only to reimburse those libraries that actually began providing services/circs to residents of the unincorporated areas. (Remember, however, that there is no guarantee that the funds currently used to fund County libraries would become part of the county-wide library funds)
- gg.** Leave the “west side” (Lake Oswego, West Linn, and Wilsonville) as is in terms of local governance, but attempt to create a centralized governance authority for the east side, and distribute existing funds equitably.

The group has not defined an ideal strategy yet, or even a process for defining that ideal. In the hopes of narrowing down some of the above options and clearing the way for future planning, the Process Committee would be interested in your thoughts on the above issues. To that end, would you please answer a few questions - unofficially? This is not meant to be a scientific poll, nor any kind of commitment on behalf of your library or city government so please be as honest as you can. We would like replies from both a CEO/ City Manager/ Assistant City Manager, and the Library Director of each LNIB member. Responses from elected officials who are informed about the issues are also welcome.

1. NDA Notes - Requirement to submit notes monthly that are taken by an NDA Secretary

For anyone that did not attend the January 19th Neighborhood Leadership Meeting, I discussed the requirement and importance for each Neighborhood Association to take meeting notes and submit them to the City. I am aware that some neighborhoods have their City Liaisons take notes. Although those are useful, the NDA bylaws require that the Secretary position of each Neighborhood be responsible for taking and submitting notes. Here is the passage taken from the bylaws that specifies this requirement:

The Secretary/Treasurer's duties may be separated if a separate Treasurer position is designated by the Neighborhood District Association (see C below). Otherwise, the Secretary/Treasurer's duties shall include:

a) Ensuring that accurate minutes of all Association meetings are kept; ensuring that attendance registration is kept at all Association meetings; ensuring that attendance reports and minutes are maintained and that they are available for review by anyone who asks; ensuring that minutes and registration lists of all meetings are forwarded to the City of Milwaukie; ensuring that meeting notification and agendas are transmitted to the City and to members in a timely manner; ensuring that current and updated lists of officers and Land Use Review Committee members are provided to the City.

Please let me know if you have any questions or concerns about taking notes. If you need a short tutoring session let me know and I will set up a time to meet with you. There is no deadline to submit the notes each month, but it would be good to have them by the end of each month so that staff is able to respond to any questions, concerns, or requests that your NDA may have.
